Patil (MLA, Former Minister of State, Government of Maharashtra) the renowned educationalist in the North Maharashtra. The directors and office bearers of the sanstha are highly qualified and with educationist view. The motto of the College is "**TEJO ASI TE AJO ME DEHI"** meant God please give me a light to shine and strength for good. This can be achieved by imparting value based education to the students.

Parola is a Tehsil place in the Jalgaon district, a rural place situated 55 kms away from Jalgaon. The Parola town takes pride in its rich history and heritage of having underground fort named as *Bhuikot Killa* (Land Laying Fort), as well as the inspirational memory of Rani Laxmibai, the queen of Jhansi. It also takes pride of having the holy places nearby for Lord Balaji as a Prati Tirupati, Tapovan, Shivdham, Nageshwar, etc.

Most of the people from this place belong to farming and farm working families. Most of the students are the first generation from their families, who avail the facility of higher education. The students from such poor families do not afford the higher education at district place. Keeping this view in mind, founder President Late Appsaheb Bhaskarrao Rajaram Patil (MLA), enlightened the lamp of education to serve the society by establishing Kisan Vidya Prasarak Santha (KVPS) and Kisan Junior College in 1976. KVP'S provided the facility of Higher Education by opening Kisan Arts and Commerce Senior College in 1977 and Science stream in June 1992, B.Voc in 2014, recognition of Geography research laboratory in 2010 and Chemistry in 2013. The institute is committed to provide the quality of Higher Education of all the section of Society at the very low cost.

The Institution enjoys the distinct position of being the first Arts, Commerce and Science College in Tehsil region. - > These objectives are further communicated to teachers at the time of staff meetings.
- These objectives are made visible through boards at prime locations.

- ➤ The vision and mission is communicated to the stakeholders, Management, trustee board and members in the meetings. It is communicated to the students in the various events organized in the college.
- 1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).
- Our college is affiliated to North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. The NMU Jalgaon designs the curriculum and college implements it as per the guidelines of university.
- For the effective implementation of the curriculum and the college undertakes various measures for planning and implementation of it such as-
- At the beginning of every academic year, the institution refers the academic calendar activities of the University and prepares action plans for various departments. In the staff meeting everything is discussed.
- ➤ In such action plan the outline of curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular and other activities is given and action plan is executed as per instructions given.
- ➤ The teachers prepare semester wise teaching plan at the beginning of the academic year. The monthly syllabus completion report is submitted to Head of Department. The periods of teacher are engaged by other members of staff in the department in absence of other members.
- ➤ The pogramme and syllabus are carried out as per academic calendar and university guidelines.
- Revised syllabi are communicated to the college by North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon.
- ➤ The faculty attends the workshop on revision of syllabus and then it is implemented.
- ➤ The college prepares academic calendar for curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- The college prepares time table and teaching plans for the teachers.
- The process of teaching includes evaluation, student centric methods of teaching and so on.
- Academic calendar is brought into practice just to develop and deploy effective implementation of curriculum.
- 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

For effective translation of the curriculum and improving teaching practices, the teachers receive following types of support from the university and institution.

#### **Support from Institution:**

- ➤ Qualified teachers have been appointed in the college for all programmes at UG courses as per norms of UGC, state Government and North Maharashtra University.
- The college also encourages the teachers to participate in the Orientation, Refresher courses, Workshops, Seminars organized by the affiliating University and Academic Staff College to update the knowledge and to improve the teaching practices. For this purpose college bears the expenditures of travelling including registration fees etc. and grants duty leave.
- ➤ The college provides educational instruments like Teaching models, and ICT facilities like projectors, smart board, CD's etc to enable teachers to ensure effective delivery of curriculum.
- ➤ The college also provides text, reference books, journals, magazines and other teaching materials.
- ➤ The North Maharashtra University, regularly organizes workshops and seminars to keep the knowledge and teaching aptitude of the teachers updated. The faculty of the college can discuss their issues or problems while participating in the meetings of the board of studies.
- ➤ Our two faculty members represents as a members of Boards of Studies and one as member of science faculty in NMU Jalgaon and other faculty members participates in syllabus framing workshops.
- The institution organizes workshops approved by university and sufficient financial infrastructural aids are provided to conduct such programmes.

#### **Support from University:**

- ➤ The university frames syllabus as per the U.G.C. norms and gives guidelines for the completion of the syllabus. University provides some text books and a list of reference books.
- ➤ The university regularly organizes workshops and seminars to revise syllabus and gives guidelines about the curriculum, the use of new educational technology, ICT in teaching and learning aspects of the curriculum and even newly introduced laboratory techniques.
- ➤ The board of study (studies) for various subjects is framed (formed) by university through the process of election. The board of studies designs the syllabus of their respective subjects.
- Further, university implements necessary revisions required in the syllabus with the approval of academic council, which helps in effective translation of the curriculum
- ➤ University conducts periodic meetings of board of studies in all subjects ensuring participation of subject teachers from the departments for the purpose of monitoring the present syllabus and for feedback from the subject teachers.

Though the curriculum is designed and revised by the North Maharashtra University; but for the effective curriculum delivery, following initiatives are taken by the institution.

- Along with conventional chalk and board method, various modern teaching techniques are used for lectures.
- The college faculty is trained by the computer department to make them familiar with the use of computers so that they are able to use the modern technological resources internet, projectors and OHP'S etc. to supplement their class room lectures.
- ➤ In addition to the regular subject classes, the college also organizes special lectures by inviting experts from various fields to share their knowledge with the students.
- > Student seminars are organized where the students are allowed to make presentations on topics of their interest which are related to the curriculum.
- For practical sessions and science laboratories, the college provides resource materials such as specimen, chemicals, glass wares, equipment's, reference books and journals in time.
- The college arranges educational tour, industrial tour, visit to research institutes, exhibitions, ecosystems and various places for historical importance to provide students a firsthand knowledge of various things.
- > Special classes are conducted for those students who could not attend the classes on account of NSS and NCC camp or participation in the sports or extra-curricular activities to make up their loss.

At second year level student can select one of the special subjects which is continued up to the third year. The subjects offered for specialization are 1) English, 2) Marathi, 3) Hindi, 4) Economics, 5) Political Science, 6) History and 7) Geography.

#### **Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.):**

The faculty of B.Com. offers following subjects in the division of FY, SY, and T.Y. B.Com. First year B.Com. contains three levels of subjects namely Language competence, Core competence and Applied component. Language competence has1) English for business, 2) Marathi or Hindi Core Competence contains 3) Micro Economic Analysis 4) Financial and Cost Accounting 5) Quantitative Techniques and Computing Skills. It has some elective options as 6) a) Modern Office Management b) Co-operative law and micro finance. Applied Component contains some elective subject namely 7) a) Principles and Practices of Banking b) Marketing and Advertising

Second year B.Com. contains 5 Core courses namely 1) Micro Economics Analysis 2) Business and Tax Laws 3) Business Management 4)

Corporate Accounting and Costing 5) Computing Management and Business Communication. Core Competence contains, some elective options such as 6)a) Entrepreneurship Development b) Business Ethics and consumer protection. Here Applied Components have some other elective options such as a) Modern Banking and Financial System b) Retail Management

Third year B.Com. consists of five courses of core competence such as 1) Indian Economic Scenario 2) Principal and Practices of Auditing 3) Income tax and competitive skill 4) Human Resources management and 5) a) Modern Management Techniques

  - ➤ Besides teaching the curriculum, various departments engage its students in Literary Quiz, Debates, Creative Writing, Classroom Seminar Presentations, Peer learning, Poster Presentations, and Interaction with scholars from other colleges and universities and discussions.
  - ➤ Institution also conducts blood donation camps, which are helpful for societies.
  - ➤ Institution also conducts Geography week, Arth Yuva Manch, World Environment Day, International AIDS Day, Anti-Tobacco Day, Teachers day, NSS and NCC day, Youth Day, International Yoga Day, Kranti Din, International Ozone day... etc. are celebrated to create awareness amongst the students.
  - > Some departments organize Field Trips, Institutional and Industrial trips that have not been included in the syllabus.

- Soft skill development programme helps the students to develop their personality and it imparts various skills such as interview techniques, communicative skills and presentation skills.
- ➤ Our Institution provides sports facilities to students, which is helpful for students to show their skills.

## 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Institution has focused attention on the development of job oriented and multiple skills in students to improve their chances of employment. Therefore our institution started B. Voc. skill oriented courses. In order to enrich the curriculum, guest lectures, study tours, field visits, industrial visits are organized by various departments.

In case of curriculum it is communicated to the University through the Board of studies (B.O.S.). After the communication to B.O.S. members, the University organizes a workshop for syllabi design and gives the guidelines to the teachers and it is helpful to the students for global employment market. The Institution organizes extracurricular and extension activities through various committees and associations.

- ➤ Every year the college invites resource persons on the occasion of celebration of various days such as Ozone day, Geography week, Vasundhara Divas, etc...to sensitize students to issues related to Environment Conservation.

A tree plantation programme is also conducted every year in the college at College Campus.

- > Students and teachers have attended inter-college seminars on Human Rights.

### 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

- ➤ The parent—teacher meets, meets of Alumni associations are a regular feature which offers rich feedback and fresh initiatives.
- ➤ The corridors have suggestion boxes which are available for soliciting the comments from students, faculty and non-teaching staff etc., serve as an excellent source of fresh ideas and insights
- > Student's feedback and suggestions are considered during the process of

- curriculum enhancement. For example, topics such as time management, conflict management and goal setting were added as per the suggestions of the students.
- ➤ Informal feedback from students takes place in the form of questions asked by faculty members.
- ➤ A suggestion box is also kept in departments where students can anonymously give feedback which is then discussed in departmental meetings.
- ➤ Some departments held brain storming sessions with faculty from other colleges. The interaction brought about new ideas and suggestions to help formulate a curriculum which is at par with recent trends in the field.

- English for Competitive Exams has started from 2014. It provides the competitive skills among students.

  - ➤ The college has adopted the criteria of 'come first serve first' for all eligible students at the entry level admission for B. A. and B. Com. Faculties.
  - Admissions are given as per the university guidelines.
  - Reservation policy of government is strictly followed
  - > Students are selected on merit basis for B.Sc. and B.Voc.
  - For Ph.D. programmes, the students have to qualify entrance examination (PET) and successful completion of Pre-Ph.D. course as per the University norms. Student after consulting with the guide develops a research proposal and synopsis and has to appear for interview before RRC of the University.

North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon has fixed certain eligibility criteria for giving admission at the entry levels of each programme. The same is strictly followed irrespective of the percentage of marks. The same is followed by all the colleges affiliated to North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon.

Yes, the admission counseling committees for various faculties are formed which comprise of members of various subjects. The students are guided and their problems regarding the admission are solved. Their suggestions are considered every year for the improvement of the process and it is keenly observed that academic interest of each student is protected. We find growth in strength of students by this committee process.

The College ensures the follow up of rules and regulations in admissions.Information is also imparted about the poor boys fund, Earn & Learn Scheme, Book bank etc. to encourage the SC/ST/SC/ST/OBC/women/differently able/ economically weaker sections/Minorities/Sportsmen/section students.

Ramp way are constructed for all the buildings and wheel chair is provided to the differently abled students whenever necessary to them.

From the below table, it is concluded that, the admissions for science faculty, are increasing every year and admissions of Arts and Commerce faculty are decreasing. #### 2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

2.2.1 How does the Institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Institution makes special arrangements for the needs of differently abled students for the enhancement in the academic and interested field. Government reservation policy for differently abled students is followed in the admission process. At present 3% reservation is available in the admission to all the courses in the institution. The institution provides following necessary facilities to the differently-abled students.

- > Special guidance and counseling by Career Guidance Cell.
- ➤ Providing special arrangements in the college for their mobility and independent functions such as ramps are provided to all buildings and wheel chair provided whenever necessary to them.
- Financial assistance is provided to the differently abled students awarded by the government departments.

### 2.2.2 Does the Institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Before the commencement of the programmes, the students are asked for their own interested fields and marks achieved in the previous examination. The seminars and orals predict the different skills in the students. During the programme, the Institution constitutes the various committees for academic, cultural and social activities. The committees arrange the various competitions viz. science quiz, G. K. test, poster presentations, seminars, group discussions, essay writing competitions, N. S. S. & N.C.C. activities, cultural activities, annual gathering, games etc. The students are thus assessed in terms of knowledge and various skills. The students those having different skills and potential are identified and the proper guidance is provided to such students to develop their potentials in the field of their own interests.

We have a formal mechanism to assess the skills and knowledge of students at the beginning of the programme. However the suggestions of the students & their parents are duly considered & efforts are made to suffice their diverse needs.

## 2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the Institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge / Remedial / Add-on / Enrichment Courses etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Our institution make the provision to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice by running the different remedial coaching classes for the subjects like Mathematics, English, Chemistry and Geography etc.

Since English being a window for overall development of the students, remedial courses in English are meticulously run. For enrichment of subject knowledge, every department organizes special talks, poster presentations, seminars, quiz contest, etc.

Yoga programmers are conducted in the college premises for the students and teachers.

### 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

To sensitize the staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment by arranging the lectures, programmes and celebration of national and international days.

The College arranges the gender sensitization programmes for female students through Yuvati Sabha. The male and female students are convinced during N. S. S. programmes about gender sensitization and inclusion like issues. The students are made aware about environmental issues by assigning the projects on environment. A course on environmental studies has been mademandatory for the first year all the faculties students by the affiliating University. Geography week is celebrated every year to make aware about environment issues 'Ozone Day' with poster presentation and lectures of eminent personalities

### 2.2.5 How does the Institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

The need of the students about advanced learning is identified with the help of students feedback form, formal discussion with students etc.

Institution makes special arrangements for providing the learning needs of advanced learners for the enhancement in the academic career. The advanced techniques viz. the use of Computer, Web and ICT based education is made available to the advanced learners. Special lectures are arranged for such students. Eminent faculties / research scholars are made available to guide such students. The advanced learners / students are encouraged to involve in workshop, research work and allowed them to participate in research festival AVISHKAR organized by affiliating University, State and National level seminars, conferences etc.

The Institution also provides the extra coaching for the students interested in the competitive examination like NET, SET, MPSC and UPSC.

# 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of dropout (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections, etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The Institution made the strict policy and restless efforts to minimize the drop out of the students. The Institution makes the result analysis after the declaration of the result of University examination and assessment. The slow and advanced learners are separated. Special care is taken to upgrade the slow learners by arranging the remedial teaching, extra teaching, etc. Thus the college succeeds in minimizing the student's dropout.

If the risk of dropping out is due to financial problems faculties and college provides financial aids through Earn and Learn scheme.

#### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

### 2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Teaching, learning & evaluation schedules are prepared by the college following the academic calendar of the university. The academic schedule is keenly observed by the heads and faculties of all the departments of respective subjects. Teaching plans are prepared according to the academic calendar giving full scope for the ICT facilities. The teaching plans are prepared under the observation of heads of the department. The plan consists of teaching units, tentative test schedule and term end examination. Effective plans and time tables of all the feasible evaluative methods are given well in advance to all the students. The academic diaries are maintained by the faculties. Diaries consist of class, time and name of the teaching units for daily performance.

The students are evaluated by college in the following methods as per their strength in the class: Tests, Tutorials, Seminars, Quiz contest, Attendance, Group Discussion, Home Assignments, semester Exam Theory/Practical

The students are evaluated by university twice in a year as we follow CGPA pattern. The exams are held at the end of each semester.

Academic Calendar together with the systems of teaching, learning and evaluation are minutely kept an eye on by the Principal of the college and the Academic Committee.

#### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

In keeping with the mission and objectives of the institution, the college IQAC committee obtains the feasible innovative ideas from other college's seminars, conferences, international database, e-journals, and education magazines & through internet. The data and innovations thus collected are further strengthened by recent ICT and other resources. All these ideas about teaching & learning are discussed meticulously among the teachers & practicable ideas are employed. IQAC committee takes the review of every teacher & suggestions are given whenever needed. The API of concerned teachers is assessed and suggestions are used in teaching and learning process by the IQAC committee. IQAC plays a vital role in the quality enhancement and sustenance of the teaching-learning process by giving timely directions and constant encouragement to the faculty and students.

## 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The teaching is totally made student-centric as we allow a dialogue method in the classrooms. There are a lot of open discussions in the classes. Teaching technology is now-a-days being replaced by the "says" of the students. Almost 2/3 of the class time is devoted to the opinions from the student community. The traditional role of the teacher as a piper is now overthrown by a new role as a facilitator only. It is in keeping with the modulations in

modern pedagogy. The students are a source of novelty is regularly put to practice by the college. All this, is engineered in the scrutiny of the Principal. The sufficient practical knowledge and training is availed with students due to well-equipped laboratories.

### 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- > Students are made aware of the preamble of Indian constitution which asks to learn & promote scientific temperament among the students and society.
- ➤ The various associations of the institute like social science, science, literary, commerce organizes various programmes and competitions to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovations.
- Above mentioned associations arranges the various lectures like Science & its advantages, Addiction-consequences, AIDS, Pollution, Plantation, Population control, Global warming, Eradication of superstitions, various national & international crises. Moreover, the institute celebrates Ozone day, Science day, Yoga day and Environment day etc...
- ➤ For enhancing creativity, students are asked to prepare posters and models for scientific exhibition on various subjects.
- > Study tours are arranged to visit scientific institutions, museums, industries etc.
- > Students are motivated to participate in Youth festival, Avishkar competitions arranged by North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon.
- > Students perform one act plays and street plays to create awareness in society.
- Quiz contests are arranged by various departments.
- > Students are asked to work on various projects for developing the power of creativity among them.
- ➤ NSS/NCC regular activities prepare students with expanded attitudes.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? e.g. Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Our Institution has made available the computers, smart board, e-library, internet facility, web, ICT, OHP and LCD projectors, T. V. etc. for teaching and our faculties use frequently such technology for effective teaching-learning. Some of our faculties have prepared and utilized scientific models for presentation during teaching.

INFLIBNET facility is available to the faculties as an e-learning resources.

### 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- ➤ Liquidizing the teaching-learning process up to the depth of the students by introducing advanced teaching aids and ICT in teaching.
- Arranging the lectures of eminent personalities, academicians, research scholars, etc. on special topics viz. scientific or popular lectures,
- Arranging study tours, industrial visits, field study, various competitions and programmes.
- Involving in research activities, encouraging participating in district, University, state, national and international level seminars, conferences, workshops, symposia, programmes, etc.
- Faculties are encouraged to participate in faculty development programmes viz. orientation/refresher course, short term courses, etc. along with seminars, conferences, symposia, workshops, etc.
- The students & faculties are not only exposed to above facilities but also allowed to attend expert lectures, seminars, workshops and are sent to deliver lectures also. The college and some faculties are subscribers of research journals of National and international standard. The college is subscriber to INFLIBNET- N-List, Ahmadabad, which makes available e-books and e-journals.

## 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

The college made the provision of students counseling by our faculty members. The students in a class are divided into few groups and each group is provided with academic and personal level guidance. It is done in all programmes/courses. The faculty-in-charge carefully monitors the regularity of attendance and academic activities of the students. Few needy students can get Psychological counseling by our faculty. Number of students got benefits in a year. To sum up, the faculties are really behaved as the good friends of the students.

Students are guided by various committees like admission committee, language association, science association etc.

We organize different soft skills development and interview technique workshops for the students of all faculties.

- **Academic Support**: Academic support is provided to students through library resources, personal guidance; inter personal communication, I.C.T. facilities, class lectures and remedial coaching. Many students are benefited by this kind of help.
- **Guidance Services**: Competitive cell, Yuvati sabha, N.C.C., N.S.S., Personality development programme, Soft skills orientation and sport department are the best geneses of guidance for one and all. The students are guided for professional training, career building, job opportunity and advanced research in the various department of the college.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the Institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Our faculty adopted the advanced and innovative approaches in teaching as ...

- ➤ Introducing Participatory and Interactive teaching techniques.
- ➤ Introduced computer, web and ICT based techniques
- > Use of charts and models (available and homemade),
- ➤ Some lectures were arranged on smart board, OHP, LCD projectors etc...
- > Scientific and popular lectures are arranged by virtual classroom and e-learning is introduced in teaching.
- > Students are encouraged to deliver seminar using ICT techniques.

  As result of above innovative methods interest of students in teaching and learning process is increased and it is reflected in the examinations results.

#### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Our Library has been enriched with near about 12169 text books and 10864 reference books, subscription of 43 national and international journals and periodicals, daily and weekly newspapers, encyclopedia, etc. The working hours of the Library are from 8.00 a. m. to 5.30 p.m. on all working days. The library is provided with facilities such as reprography, computers, broadband internet connectivity, e-library by INFLIBNET (N-LIST, UGC) and educational CD's. Advisory committee observes and monitors the activities of the Library. Library is partly computerized and college has purchased software to facilitate lending of books, purchase of books and stock verification by using computer. A computer is available for e-learning in the library for students and staff. Students and staff used all these resources from library to augment the teachinglearning process. In addition to this departmental library facilities are available.

## 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

We face shortage of time due to semester system, co-curricular and sports activities. We have to cope up with absence of students due to calendar activities. There is a little hurrying up.Still, the syllabi of all the subjects & classes are completed in tenure as per the teaching plans prepared in the beginning of the academic year. If needed, extra lectures are arranged.

Principal and Vice Principals of the college are careful to share information about syllabus completion by talking to teachers and students.

#### 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The Institution doesn't monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching and learning only from the results of unit tests, internal tests and University examinations. However, the quality has been monitored and evaluated also from participation of students in various competitions organized by affiliating University and others viz. Avishkar, Ashwamedhas, research work, use of technology and models in teaching learning, healthy interaction among the faculties and students, performance in classroom and seminars, awareness achieved by the students, project work completed and the results published, utilization of e-learning resources and library resources, the live environment of the college, etc. At the end of every academic year feedback forms are filled by the students, the suggestions made are evaluated and discussed in staff meeting to improve the quality of teaching and learning.

#### 2.4 Teacher Quality

Qualified and competent teaching staff is employed by the management following existing UGC, University and Government of Maharashtra rules & procedures. The staff is updated by orientation, refresher courses and short term courses etc. As the 100% faculty is engaged in research work which helps to meet the changing requirement of the curriculum.

Faculties are motivated to participate in the research work, prepare and submit the faculty recharge scheme, minor / major research scheme / project to funding agencies viz. UGC, DST, CSIR, VCRMS, etc. for financial assistance to recharge the faculties through the work done. The College provides the infrastructural and basic facilities as a support for research and academic publications. The computer and internet facilities are made available for publications of research papers in most reputed and referred journals having high impact factors. Faculties are relievedfor teaching in other Institutions by maintaining the proper teaching status in our Institution. ## 2.4.6 Has the Institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The evaluation of teachers is done by the students and by the external Peers during the CAS period. Feedback audit from students and external peers is introduced for the evaluation of teachers and quality of the teaching-learning process. Feedback forms are distributed among the students, teacher wise, at the end of every academic year. Feedback forms mainly focuses on the knowledge and teaching skill of the faculty as an individual, content covered, innovations introduced during teaching, laboratory work, etc. The students are asked not to write their names or roll numbers on the feedback forms by providing freedom to the students and confidentiality is maintained. The filled forms are collected by the feedback committee. The feedback committee and IQAC reviews and submits to the Principal. Finally, the Principal Counsels the faculties which do not meet the benchmarks. Teachers evaluation has also been made by the parents and the problems, if exist, are resolved during parents meetings with the faculties.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The institution ensures awareness about evaluation processes among the students by: furnishing notifications among students on the general notice boards, university SMS, phone calls, digital university websites, newspapers and the oral announcement by the teachers in the live classes whenever necessary. All announcements are displayed on

special examination notice board. There are three types of notice boards particularly student notice board for specific department, faculty notice board in common room and office notice board for non-teaching. The teachers introduce evaluation processes to the entry-students in the beginning of the academic year while introducing syllabi and question paper formats. The university publishes news about the changes in the evaluation process for the cognizance of students/staff. The circulars and GRs from the government, university and institution are served at the disposal of the faculty via emails, notices and oral medium. Sometimes workshops on evaluation processes are hosted by both the institution and the university.

### 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The Institution adopted the same examination-evaluation pattern as declared by the affiliating university and it is mandatory to all the Colleges affiliated to the University. However, the students are evaluated by group discussions, seminars, oral tests, etc., which makes the evaluation more interesting and beneficial to the students The affiliating University initiated various evaluation reforms as given bellow...

- > Semester pattern is applicable for theory and Practical examination.
- Introduction of University and College Assessment (U. A. and C. A.),
- Introduction of objective type and multiple choice questions in question papers,
- ➤ Bar coding System for Answer sheets.
- > Students can challenge the evaluation of answer sheets of University examination and can demand the photocopy of the answer sheet from the affiliating University,
- ➤ For B. Voc. Skill Courses the skill competence is evaluated by Sector Skill Council as per the NSQF Guidelines

The College adopted the following evaluation reforms...

- > Semester pattern is applicable for theory and Practical examination
- ➤ The pattern of question papers and evaluation process declared by University are used intact for College Assessment i. e. for unit tests, internal tests, etc.
- > Same criteria are applicable for the setting up the question papers of unit tests, internal tests, etc. those declared by the University.
- ➤ Home assignments, seminars, orals, etc. are optional to the students and faculties,
- > Students can challenge the evaluation of answer sheets of College examination and can demand the photocopy of the answer sheet from the College
- ➤ For B. Voc. Skill Courses the skill competence was evaluated by Sector Skill Councils per the NSQF Guidelines.

### 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The university and the college have fool-proof system for the effective implementation of examination reforms. However institution has responsibility to initiate all the works of examination. There is an examination committee for the effective implementation of the evaluation system in college. This committee undertakes and executes all internal exams fairly under the guidance of the principal. Every student has to undergo college assessment (CA) and university assessment (UA) and the institution keenly observes the implementation of the evaluation process. The details are furnished below:

The College assessment (CA) of students is carried out by the teachers in the following ways:

- Attendance of the students in the theory and practical classes.
- ➤ Behavior in the class and campus.
- > Seminars/home assignments/field work/projects/tutorials/tests.

The university assessment (UA) of the students is done by the teachers in the following ways:

- Performance in the practical exams.
- Performance in viva-voce, project reports, study tour and excursion reports.
- Performance in theory exams.

## 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student's achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Formative evaluation in every semester is done as internal assessment by the college faculties. This is defined as College Assessment (CA). It is done by considering attendance in the class by interaction in the class

- > Tests, Tutorials, Seminars, Group Discussion
- > Behavior in the class
- Participation in quiz, interview, oral testing, practical exam, etc.

All these tests are diagnostics as well as remedial as they provide effective feed-backactive involvement in learning which help the teachers for assessment of teaching outcome.

Summative assessment is the final assessment of performance at the end of every semester. It is carried out by University known as University Assessment (UA).

Formative and Summative assessments have typically contrastive outcomes. Formative tests help the teacher to decide on the teaching learning process as per the academic level of the students. Summative evaluation helps to determine that how much of the content taught is retained by the student.

Following are some positive impacts are cited due to above evaluation systems..

- Percentage of student's success has increased.
- > Students are more regularly attending the classes.

# 2.5.5. Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weight age for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.).

Internal examination is conducted strictly by college providing the class wise & subject wise time table. While calculating internal assessment, due importance is assigned to behavior, attendance, seminars, tests, group discussion, project work, home assignment etc. It carries 20 marks in 80(UA) + 20(CA) pattern until 2009.

The CGPA pattern 40+10 is introduced from 2010 onwards. It carries 40(UA) + 10(CA) for every paper in each semester. The 10 marks of internal assessment-college assessment (CA) are decided by considering the behavior, attendance, seminar, home assignments, tests performance etc.

The CGPA pattern 60+40 is introduced from 2014 onwards. It carries 60(UA) + 40(CA) for every paper in each semester. The 40 marks of internal assessment-college assessment (CA) are decided by considering the behavior, attendance, seminar, home assignments, tests performance, group discussion etc.

The examination process is totally insulated with secrecy of all confidential matters. The students are informed about schedule of exam well in advance and their performance is displayed on the general notice boards before it is sent to the university. The students note down their marks and meet the examination department authority if they have any grievances in the assessment outcomes.

### 2.5.6 What are the graduate attribute specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

- ➤ Provision of qualitative higher education to all sects of the society in the doors of rural peoples, to make the students best citizen of India,
- To increase the number of female students in higher education, to achieve the student's highest progression, to make the students competent, confident and excellent, etc. are the graduate attributes specified by the college.
- > The college ensures the attainment of these attributes by providing the effective teaching, learning and evaluation process, which contains the advanced teaching aids, computer, web and ICT based education, etc.
- The college provides the counseling to students to achieve the attributes.

### 2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The students approach to the subject teacher and to the examination committee in case of any problems regarding evaluation. If student is not satisfied, he approaches to the Redressal and grievance committee. The problems regarding evaluation system are solved by this committee from time to time at college level.

- The problems regarding evaluation by university are forwarded through Principal to the university and get solved.
- ➤ The students, who have doubts about their results, apply for the photocopy of the answer sheet through the process of verification punctuated by the university. If the doubt of student is confirmed, he challenges for redressal.

#### 2.6 Student performance and Learning Outcomes

Yes, institutions have learning outcomes. We display hoardings and banners which showcase our learning outcomes for the student's perusal. We publish photographs of meritorious students in *Kisaniya* (College Magazine). The prospectus and website of the college also spreads this awareness among the students right in the beginning.

Institution monitors & communicates the progress & performance of the students subject-wise by displaying the internal marks (college assessment) on notice board. The results are displayed on college website for students. The university results (mark lists) are also published on the university website and mark sheets are distributed to the students.

Class-wise and subject wise results are analyzed. This analysis is reached according to merit such as Distinction, First class, Second class, Pass class, Allowed to Keep Term (ATKT), failed & grade wise result percentage is also calculated. Result analysis helps to concentrate on success and failure. Causes of the same are sought and utilized for the betterment of future.

The result analysis of the students from last four years depicts the increasing progress and achievements of students day by day and the students are satisfied with their results as well. The students are not bothering about their percentage of marks, because they achieved the versatility in all around development, viz. awareness in environmental

issues, moral values, confident, competent, devoted in self-learning and research, project work, sports activities, participation in Avishkar, Yuvarang, Ashwamedhas, etc

Parola is a Tehsil place in the Jalgaon district; a rural place situated 55 kms away from Jalgaon. Most of the people from this place belong to poor farmer's families. The students from such poor families do not afford the higher education at district place. Also in the rural area the proportion of girl's higher education is very less. Keeping this view in mind, Late Appasaheb Bhaskarrao Rajaram Patil (MLA), enlightened the lamp of education to serve the society by establishing Kisan Vidya Prasarak Sanstha (KVP's) at Parola. KVP's started Junior college in 1976, provided facility of higher education by opening Kisan Arts and Commerce Senior College in 1977 and Science stream was started in June 1992. The institution is committed to provide the quality higher education to the students of all sections of the society at very low cost under the leadership of Hon'ble Chairman Annasaheb Dr. Satish B. Patil (MLA, former minister of state, Govt. of Maharashtra).

To transform the rural students in the form of research and technology, Hon'ble Management initiated two research laboratories. Today, the institution has two recognized research laboratories in Geography and Chemistry. The research and guiding faculties of the college, contribute in publishing the results in terms of the research articles in national and international referred journals. Also, the administration and faculties of our institution work hard in that direction to enhance and maintain the quality of thehigher education,

The institution is also committed to generate the human resource from the rural society by inculcating the moral values among the students and to make them

educationists, researchers, technologists and best citizens to serve the Nation. To satisfy this purpose, the institution has paid its full devotion and attention in academic progression of students by providing the well qualified and high profile faculties in the college, well equipped laboratories, advanced tools and aids for education, computers and internet, infrastructure, etc. To fulfill the need of skilled persons Management has started B. Voc. Software Development and Soil Water conservation since June 2014. The members of the management visit various departments to ensure that the purchase is properly being put to practice for the benefit of the learners from time to time. They pay surprise visits to the theoretical classes to verify whether the teaching plans, attendance, daily preparatory jottings are lugged by the teachers or not for the cause of effective teaching. - ➤ The Institutional support is extended to the faculty members contesting election for various statuary executive and academic bodies of the University.

## 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The academic and administrative work in our college is decentralized. The administration is decentralized through the various committees of the faculty like, Admission, Discipline, Purchase, Examination, Time Table, Magazine, Student Welfare, N.S.S., N.C.C., Planning, Competitive Exams, Student council, Publicity, Student Placement, Grievance cell etc. The entire plan of decentralized activities is carefully worked out by the Principal in consultation with the various stakeholders of the college.

The responsibility of overviewing the activities of each department is entrusted on the respective head of the departments, while the responsibilities of some joint co-curricular, extracurricular, outreach and extension activities are entrusted on the Chairpersons of the respective committees. The activities are coordinated by Vice Principal, Heads of Departments, Chairpersons of committees and senior faculty members.

The office superintendent coordinates administrative activities under the supervision of the Principal. The office superintendent allocates the work to Head clerk, Senior clerk and Junior clerks, while the accountant has been assigned the task of

keeping accounts and managing finances.

- ➤ Local Management Committee (LMC) is constituted to determine and review the strategies and policies of the college.
- ➤ The college has an Examination Committee comprises one or two members from each faculty, aided by sufficient members from the non teaching staff. The Examination Committee takes decisions to conduct examinations, assigning supervision duties, distribution of remuneration etc.
- ➤ Besides, the college also formed several committees that carry out the activities assigned to them.
- ➤ Decisions regarding the requirement of finance, infrastructural improvement, staff recruitment, and other matters of importance are communicated by the Principal to the Board of Management, which implements them.
- ➤ The Principal, being at the helm as the chief functionary is aided by chairpersons of various committees, and heads of the departments in taking various decisions, supervising and monitoring performance and maintaining discipline.=
- Student Council members are actively involved in various committees like Science and social science association, Literary Association, Annual Social Gathering etc.

### 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, the college promotes a culture of participative management. The Institution plans are developed through the committees: 1) Local Management Committee, 2) IQAC and 3) Student Council.

The participation is at the level of students (students council), the staff (at the department level) H.O.D., Management (LMC). Besides this there are different committees involved in the perspective planning and development like Admission, Time Table, Research and Development, Examination, Library, NSS, Student Welfare, Grievance, Purchase, Earn and Learn, Gymkhana in which the teachers, students and administrators are included.

- > Regular meetings of the staff and all committees are held for effective planning.
- The plans come from different committees to the Principal.
- ➤ The Principal takes the requirements and plans of the college on the agenda in the meeting of the L.M.C.
- ➤ The necessary budget provisions are chalked out in these meetings. The IQAC looks after the quality sustenance in academic activities and maintains the records of every meeting. Normally four meetings are held in a year.

#### **6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment**

### 6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

In the joint meeting with Management, Principal and staff, the policies are drafted about teaching quality, performance in education, administrative works, research, performance in the sports, introducing new courses, strengthening the carrier guidance cell, college campus, awareness programmes, such as water harvesting, rural development activities, Soil water testing, computer training to all teachers, organizing seminar and conferences, increase the infrastructural facilities etc.


- ➤ Technology aided teaching, actual field visit, industrial study tour, training programme is organized.
- An awareness programme for effective implementation of water harvesting was successfully introduced through, N.S.S., and N.C.C. unit of the college.
- ➤ Computer training programme for teaching and non teaching staff was conducted in which the staff member from teaching and non teaching participated.
- ➤ During the academic year 2013-14 construction of new building which includes classrooms and laboratories was taken up.
- ➤ In the academic year 2014-15 the development of the new laboratories for B. Voc. Software Development and B. Voc. Soil and Water conservation were carried out.
- Some teachers submitted their major and minor research project proposal to UGC and North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon.
- ➤ The placement cell has helped to provide necessary guidance for placement of students.
- ➤ Every year college organizes state level workshop for Techniques in Preparation of NET/SET examination in Chemistry.
- > Teachers are encouraged to participate in workshops, seminars and conferences.

### 6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.


The Institution has perspective plan for next five years for development. This plan includes construction of Sports indoor hall, Library, Seminar hall, hostel, other infrastructure and man power management. The plan constitutes to start T.Y.B. Sc. Computer Science, T. Y. B. Voc. and P. G. courses in different academic programmes.

### 6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The internal organizational structure of the Institute is as follows....



- ➤ At first level Structure decisions are made about the major policies at Director Board level.
- > Second level is Local Management Committee.
- > Third level is Principal.
- > Decisions are taken at department level by H.O.D.
- > Decisions are taken at office level by Registrar and office superintendent.
- Decision making process



- > Through regular staff meetings of the various committees for organizing different activities and in the meeting of the Heads of the entire departments the objectives are communicated.
- ➤ The Principal discusses the objectives of the perspective planning for development of the college. Suggestions and requirements from every individual employee are invited in the staff meeting.
- ➤ Decisions and resolutions of the meeting are communicated to all the employees by displaying the decisions on the staff notice boards.
- The notices are kept in the staff file for the particular period.
- ➤ The relevant information on perspective planning of development of the college is also displayed on the student's notice boards for the benefit of the students.
- ➤ IQAC is a nodal point where the perspective developments are planned in view of the needs of the time.
- > Every individual in the college staff is involved in developmental plan of the college.

### 6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following.

#### • Teaching & Learning

- ➤ The Institution prepares the academic calendar in which the plans for all the activities are given month wise.
- ➤ The teaching plans are prepared by teachers, notified to the students, and supervised continuously.
- Extra lectures are held, if required. The course wise teaching plan is made by each teacher at the beginning of every year.
- The teachers submit syllabus completion reports to the H.O.D.
- For UG programs tutorials and tests are conducted by the Institution for internal evaluation of students in a semester.
- Tutorials/assignments/group discussion/Seminars are conducted for the internal assessment of Students. Practical are prescribed for science and commerce students which include project reports, case studies and report writing etc.
- > Semester theory, practical and oral examinations are conducted as per the schedule and the norms of the University.

#### • Research and Development:

- ➤ The college encourages teachers to take up major and minor research projects sponsored by UGC, DST, CSIR, Govt. of India and North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon.
- ➤ The college encourages the teachers to undertake attending conference, extension activities, publication of research papers, books etc.

Extends financial assistance for attending conferences/seminars etc.

#### • Community Engagement:

➤ N.S.S., N.C.C., Sports, Cultural Program, Health Camps, Surveys are organized to enrich knowledge and experience of the students and staff etc.

#### • Human Resource Management:

Staff requirement are properly estimated (teaching and non-teaching). Suitable staff is recruited by management and it is properly placed at different departments. Training is also provided internally. Discipline is also maintained. Staff development is of prime importance for the Institution. All the necessary facilities are given to them.

#### • Industry Interaction:

Field visits and study tours are organized for Chemistry, Geography, Botany and Zoology students. Besidesthis the industrial visits are organized for B.Sc. Chemistry and Commerce students, which give work experience in the respective subjects. Special lectures and training was arranged for B. Voc. Students.

## 6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Institution uses the information collected through the staff meetings, meeting of student council, L.M.C. and other committees. The Institution takes feedback from the students, analyses it and acts upon it for performance improvement.

- ➤ The feedback regarding classroom teaching, Time Table, Practical Batches, Library Time Table, Issuing Books, Internet use by students etc. are received from the students at the end of each term of the year and inputs are used for improvement in performance of the college.
- ➤ The feedback about the academic matter is analyzed by IQAC and necessary steps are taken for performance improvements.

### 6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

Management provides the encouragement in various ways:

- > By formal and informal appreciation of work.
- > Encouragement for taking responsibilities.
- Necessary facilities are provided like books, guidance, and computer, Stationary.
- > By providing promotion, giving facilities, letter of appreciation.
- The college has staff academy in which teachers are encouraged to make presentation on any topic of their choice in presence of all the teachers and staff,

- which helps in sharing of knowledge, information and innovations in diverse fields.
- ➤ The college also encourages teachers to take up major and minor research projects sponsored by the UGC, CSIR, Govt. of India and BCUD, North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon.
- ➤ They are also encouraged to participate and make presentation at various Seminar, Conferences, Workshops, and Symposia etc.
- ➤ The faculty of the college always shares the knowledge and skills across the department.
- ➤ The college has National Service Scheme (N.S.S.) and N. C. C. which not only establishes relationship with society but also promotes co-operation among them.

### 6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The management council has made 10 resolutions in the last year. Out of these 8 resolutions were implemented by the management in his year.

## 6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes, there is a provision for according the status of autonomy to the affiliated college by the affiliated University. At present the college has not made any progress with reference to obtaining autonomy.

Yes, there is a grievance redressal committee to consider the grievances of the students. The committee holds meeting and analyzesthe grievances and make the redresses of grievances. The Principal and the Vice Principal also attend the meeting and try to redress the grievances (if any) of parents and members of the general public. Inmeeting of the Principal, Management and LMC the important complaint received during the year are analyzed area wise / subjectwise and steps are taken to remove the causes of the complaints

## 6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

Yes, there is one case pending in court. The issues are relating appointment of a teacher. Decisions are yet to be made.

## 6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes, the Institution has introduced feedback mechanism for evaluation of teacher by the students. A committee of faculty member is formed which looks after the evaluation of teachers by the students. For this the Institution uses feedback format decided by the college IQAC. All the teachers of all the courses are evaluated. The teachers on or below average level are instructed by the principal individually and advised to prepare themselves by reading reference books and seeking guidance of the senior faculty members for effective teaching.

#### **6.3** Faculty Empowerment Strategies

### 6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

- ➤ The management provides financial assistance to teacher going for presentation in Seminar, Conferences, Workshop and Symposia.
- ➤ The college provides Duty Leave, Allowances for Travel and Accommodation to the teachers who participate in National, International, State, University and Local Seminars, Conferences, Workshop, Symposia. The college bears the cost of subscriptions of journals in various subjects.
- ➤ The Institution prepares and submits the budgetary proposal for the same to the University / UGC for approval and sanction.
- ➤ The IQAC has organized workshop on ICT for teaching and non teaching staff to improve the professional development.

## 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

- Institution allows the staff to participate in national and international conference which helps them to develop skills.
- ➤ The Institution has staff academy in which lectures of faculties are arranged.
- ➤ The faculties are encouraged to conduct and to attend seminars, workshops, conferences, symposia, refresher course and orientation courses.
- > To carry out minor and major research projects.
- A good rapport is maintained with the staff by the management to create healthy work environment.
- ➤ Self-appraisal forms prescribed for APIs are submitted to the management for evaluation and decision regarding career advancement.
- Percentage of teachers benefited is near about 100.0 %.

## 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

Self-appraisal forms of the teachers are regularly filled by the staff. Strong and weak points are noted and the concerned staff members are provided the necessary motivation, guidance and help to improve and make further progress. Self appraisal method is carried out with the help of respective Head of the departments.

- The actual classroom teaching is observed by the HOD and by the Principal.
- > The resources are promoted and are shared with the colleagues and students.
- ➤ The institution provides financial assistance to teachers going for presentation in seminar, conference, workshop, symposia etc.
- The college bears the cost of subscriptions of journals of various subjects.

## 6.3.4 What is the outcome of there view of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The concerned committee of management studies and scrutinizes the appraisal reports and whenever necessary takes the suitable action. The actions include reprimanding the staff, issuing memo to the staff, giving serious warnings about the frequent defaults / deficits.

## 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Staff development is of prime importance for the Institution. All necessary facilities are given to them. Financial assistance is also given for medical problem and the loan is waved if the member dies before the repayment of the loan. The welfare Schemes available for the staff are:

- The employee's credit society: There is a employees credit society "Kisan Patsanstha". This credit society provides following facilities to their members: i) Long Term Loan (Sanctioned in single day), ii) Emergency Loans, iv) Accidental Insurance benefit, v) Felicitation and cash awards to meritorious student's, vi) Felicitation of members on acquiring Ph.D., M. Phil, and other achievements and vii) Financial help to medical treatment of serious illness and hospitalization.
- For faculty expenses in case of further studies or paper presentation financial support is given. Maximum staff has taken benefit of employees' welfare scheme.
- > Group Insurance of all the employees was drawn in every year.
- ➤ Felicitation of members on acquiring Ph.D., M. Phil, and other achievements by the institute.

### 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

To attract the eminent faculty institution give advertisement of vacant post in State and national level news paper as well on web site of college and North Maharashtra University. Management takes all care to retain good faculty members.

#### **6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization**

### 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The Finance & Accounts Department attends to all work related to accounting, including treasury and bank operations and preparation of the annual draft budget of the college. The General budget is prepared by the Institution and sanctioned by the LMC for effective and efficient use of available resources

Finance and Accounts Department, working under the supervision of the Senior Superintendent and the administrative control of the Principal. The Principal is responsible for monitoring and controlling the financial procedures that result from implementing the approved financial plans for optimal performance.

The financial resources of the college are managed in a very effective and proper manner. For efficient use of the financial resources, the budget is prepared. The following committees are accountable to monitor effective and efficient the use of available financial resources like Executive council, Governing Council, Local managing committee

Each and every transaction is supported by the vouchers. All the collections are deposited in the bank and all expenditure, recurring and non-recurring, are incurred through cheques. Every day, Daily Collection (DC Book) and cash in hand at the end of the day are endorsed by Principal at the closing hour of the day. The statistical-status is communicated to the top management. Only duly authorized persons can operate through the bank. For effective check on the accounts the two tier system is followed; the internal and the external audit. Internal audit is done perpetually. The internal audit committee consists of Head of institution, Office Superintendent and the internal auditor. The external audit is done by the Chartered Accountant before the session

- Institution has formed a purchase committee which looks after the financial matters. Quotations are invited for purchase of equipment.
- Purchase of equipment, furniture and other materials are from renowned private firms/ companies.
- ➤ The Management provides all infrastructural and non-grant salary helps to the staff appointed.
- The non-teaching staff looks after the utilization of UGC funds.
- Payment is made through account payee cheque only.

## 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The college has internal and external audit system. The internal audit is done by Registrar and Account Clerk while external audit is carried out by Chartered Accountant appointed by the institution for each financial year. The audited report by the external auditor is placed before the Management in the meeting for vetting and rectification, if any. The remarks given by the auditor are taken into consideration in the nest year. In the second stage representative of joint director of higher education which go through the audited statements in detail in order to examine the legality of receipt and payments. In the last stage auditor general will audit. There is no audit objection since last four years (audit reports are attached here with i.e. annexure).

The last audit has been done till financial year 2014-15.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and there serve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any. (Attached audited income and expenditure statement of the years 2011-12, 12-13, 13-14 and 2014-15)

The College is under salary grant of the state government and of the UGC under 2(f) and 12(b). Under the UGC XI/XII plan, the College has received Rs. 1,47,82,000/- The college has major sources of funding are as follows:

- > Total fee collected from the students.
- > Grants received from State Government
- Central Government.
- > Grants received from UGC under various schemes.
- Funds received from North Maharashtra University Jalgaon under various heads.
- > Donations.
- > Funds from Management.

Further if there is any deficit on account of recurring & non recurring expenditure, the management makes up the deficit amount. Apart from F. Ds, there are no reserve funds available in the last year as college has no provision for such reserve funds.

Deficit balance is supported by the management of the sanstha.

The institution has made efforts to get UGC funds. The funds sanctioned have been utilized as per the rules and regulations and for the purpose for which they were sanctioned.

- 3. Implementation of Dress code to the students and staff.

Yes, the IQAC has external members in its committee. External members provide the necessary input, feedback and suggestions on various issues.

### d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IOAC?

It is democratically free to have a student as a member of IQAC. There are two representatives from alumni are the members of IQAC of the institution. It makes students get to know institutional affairs because students are regarded the centre of teaching learning activities. The key role of students is set free in full swing in the meeting of IQAC. Students and alumni are members of IQAC and hence participate in decision making of IQAC. They provide necessary input, feedback, recommendations for enhancing quality of the College. IQAC is in this way the best platform for society to the institutional interaction.

### e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC communicates and engages staff by organizing capacity building session, training them in the use of ICT, conducting meetings, workshops etc.

- ➤ Expert lectures, guidance, student development programmes are often organized.

- ➤ The NSS unit actively involves and supports the community at large and helps in spreading the message of national integration.
- > Students' sports interests are promoted by providing them indoor and outdoor games facilities, by the College.
- Computerized lab helps students to develop their communicative ability and IT based knowledge.
- ➤ Students support schemes like Earn and Learn, Book Bank facility, Concession in fees etc. are practiced.
- ➤ The College has formative and summative evaluation system.
- ➤ The career counseling and guidance cell helps students appear for competitive exams.
- ➤ The College has student council, which supports staff in organizing activities on the campus.

#### Functions of the above mechanism.

- ➤ The Principal and the IQAC regularly conduct meetings regarding the planning and development on the campus.
- ➤ The Principal collects feedback from students for teachers and thereby controls the teaching-learning system.
- ➤ The College has promoted research interest among the faculty members resultantly, 12 faculty members have completed Ph.D. and 12 have completed M. Phil.
- ➤ The College has organized University and State level workshops, to enhance the quality education and itsapplication for staff and students.
- ➤ The College has introduced Career Oriented Course and provided students centric and job- oriented academic system.
- The students are provided exposure to their talent and expressive power through the College magazine "Kisaniya".
- ➤ The curricular and co-curricular and extra-curricular programmes added among the students a novel and innovative learning system.
- ➤ Skill based education programme like B. Voc. Software Development and Soil Water Conservation are introduced in the institution.

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness:

Kisan Arts, Commerce and Science College Parola is situated between Dhule and Jalgaon District at National Highway No.6. Dhule to Nagpur. It is the first college in Parola Taluka, established by Late Appsaheb Bhaskarrao Rajaram Patil (Ex. M.L.A.). Parola is famous for the prestigious Fort which shows a strong relation to Rani Laxmibai. Moreover, Balaji Temple is the most popular in the region of Khandesh.

#### 7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

At present, there is no formal green audit in the Institution but the Institution is eco-friendly by organizing the activity of tree plantation. Campus cleaning and maintenance is regularly done by the volunteers of N.S.S., N.C.C., Earn and Learn Scheme. Being very sensitive to the environment.

#### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus eco-friendly?

#### **Energy Conservation:**

The Institution's rooms and classrooms are well spacious with full of natural light and air. The classrooms are made with sufficient cross ventilation and light so that the use of electricity can be minimized. The Institution uses the CFL and LED lamps of low wattage in the classroom. This has helped a lot in conservation of energy. All the students, non-teaching and teaching staff have the 'motto' and they have taken the initiative to switch off all the electrical and electronics equipment's when not in use.

#### Use of renewable energy:

The college has not yet started using renewable energy. But it plans to install solar panels and adopt other innovative practices in the near future. Students are well aware of the use of solar energy, wind energy etc.

#### Water harvesting:

- The institution has water harvesting system in all new and old buildings.
- The department of chemistry stores the rain water and it is used as distilled water for practical's in Chemistry and for research activities.
- ➤ To make aware of water harvesting institute has started Soil and Water conservation degree programme under B. Voc.

➤ During special NSS winter camp volunteers make awareness among the villagers and construct Nala Bunding in *Shramdan*.

#### **Check dam construction:**

Small check dams are constructed in the adopted village of NSS such as Toli, Titvi, Mhasve and Taradi villages of Parola tehsil. These dams help to store water and percolation in the soil and recharge of wells in the village, which definitely benefits to the farmers.

#### **Efforts for carbon neutrality**

With the help of N.S.S., N.C.C, Earn and Learn scheme efforts have taken to reduce the carbon in the atmosphere and the campus is made green. The impact of our efforts made awareness among the students to minimize the use of petrol and diesel and hence the lowering of carbon. The Institution has done arrangements for the parking of vehicles in the College ground. The students and staff were convinced to use the vehicles minimum. The vehicles on every Monday of the week are banned in the campus. This helps in keeping the campus clean, as much as possible. The dead leaves are buried, instead of combustion in the soil and manure is made which is used.

#### **Plantation:**

Tree plantation in the campus has been initiated by the auspicious hands of Hon'ble Annasaheb Dr. Satish Bhaskarrao Patil, (M.L.A.) President of Kisan Vidya Prasarak Sanstha and Dr. Y. V. Patil, Principal of the institution. The institutional campus is surrounded by trees. The N.S.S., N.C.C volunteers and students of the College have taken the care of it. Plantation is done in the campus as well as in adopted villages of NSS.

All the first year students have compulsory subject of Environmental Studies. So, during their project on Environmental Studies, the students were convinced for tree plantation and few students have made the plantation at their own places, farms and homes.

#### **Hazardous waste management:**

There is no hazardous waste material generates in the Institution. In case of laboratory waste, maximum care has been taken by adopting few processes, such as by dumping deep in the ground. Other waste materials are collected by the warning vehicle of the Municipal Council of Parola.

#### e-waste management:

Per year e-waste collection is very less and whatever is formed that is sent to recycling plant. If some parts are useful in other systems they are kept aside for future use.

#### Library

- ➤ Library is shifted on second floor in newly constructed spacious hall of the B wing building where there is full of natural light and fresh air is available.

- Network resource center provided with free internet facility for students and staff

- ➤ The institute organized computer literacy workshop for teaching and non-teaching staff.
